The Latin American Association of Population Studies (ALAP) invites researchers from all countries to send contributions to the seventh continental conference that will be realized in partnership with the twentieth Brazilian meeting of population studies. The next ALAP Conference will be held at [Bourbon Cataratas Convention](#) in Foz do Iguaçu, Brazil, 17-22 October 2016. The central topic this year is “Unity and diversity of demographic processes: political challenges for Latin America and the Caribbean in an international perspective”.

The scientific committee will consider only abstracts/papers submitted at the conference website: www.abep.org.br/alapabep

The authors should to send a short abstract (maximum of 2500 characters, including spaces) to one of themes listed below until 7 March 2016. After this step, between 8 March and 30 April 2016, they need to return to the conference website and upload the extended abstract (4 pages) or completed paper – format doc or docx. The abstract and paper must be submitted in Spanish, Portuguese, English or French. In the regular sessions there will not be simultaneous translation.
